WEEK 6: LET LOVE COVER CONFLICT NOT "CUT DISCOMFORT OUT OF YOUR LIFE."

MAIN POINT

The clichés about cutting people out of your life, even a spouse, who do not serve your life goals are common. God uses marriage to make us uncomfortable, so we can cut the sin out of our life—not the people we have committed to. The book of Proverbs is raw about the reality of conflict in relationships and honest about how damaging and frustrating they can be. Passages like "better to live on the corner of the roof than with a nagging wife" (Proverbs 25:24) and "Better a dry crust with peace than a house full of feasting with strife" (Proverbs 17:1). Those Proverbs were given as warnings to young men about being sure they pursued someone of character, before they were married. After marriage, even with two amazing people, the reality is that there will be conflicts. You can stir them up or you can cover them up. Love covers them, hatred stirs them. Let love cover the conflict by remembering that God has covered all of your sin with His love.
